THE MYRIAPODA IN THE AUSTRALIAN MUSEUM.

PART I.—CHILOPODA.

It has, therefore, been considered a better plan to add to the observations furnished by the material of the Museum, full descriptions borrowed from the more recent authors and as complete synonymical indications as possible. Thus, students will have close at hand material for comparison as well as the necessary particulars for identification.

May this attempt to win sympathies to the cause of the much disregarded Myriapods meet with some success.
